Raj Jayadev is a writer and activist organizing among youth and immigrant workers in Silicon Valley. As a young South Asian temporary worker in one of the Valley's many "high tech" assembly lines, Jayadev was exposed to the long hours, low wages and lack of security common to this key sector of workers in the industry. His activities as a labor organizer and advocate were recently featured in the independent film, *Secrets of Silicon Valley*. Jayadev is currently a staff member of *Silicon Valley De-Bug, The Voice of the Young and Temporary*, an activist organization sponsored by Pacific New Service which produces an online magazine and a bilingual printed publication. Jayadev also conducts writing workshops for youth incarcerated in San Jose's Juvenile Hall. His students produce a regular publication entitled, *The Beat*.
