Dr. Alma Garcia will discuss Chicana Feminist thought as expressed by writers and activists, tracing its development through the turbulent 1960s and 1970s. Dr. Garcia is an Associate Professor of Sociology and Ethnic Studies at Santa Clara University, specializing in race, class and gender studies, Latin American studies and social change, and Mexican American studies. Her latest book is an anthology entitled, *Chicana Feminist Thought: The Basic Historical Writings* (1997, Routledge).

Dr. Garcia's talk will take place in the CHC classroom as part of the CHC's current theme on social activism. The CHC's current exhibit, "The Whole World's Watching: Peace and Social Justice Movements of the 1960s and 1970s." will be open for viewing immediately follow her presentation.
