1. Why do you want to become the DASG Internal Officer position you applied for and what do you hope to achieve?

1. Why do you want to become the DASG Internal Officer position you applied for and what do you hope to achieve?

After participating as a candidate in the DASG elections, I developed a strong interest in the election process and quickly became aware of the significant issues that affected this year's elections. It became clear to me that many of these problems stemmed from an outdated and insufficiently detailed elections code. As our campus community evolves and new campaign tools and platforms emerge, our election procedures must also adapt.

I have followed the whole process in detail, attending all related meetings from beginning to end. My engagement grew from initial curiosity to a deep commitment, and I have studied the elections code extensively, to the point where I know it by heart. The recent election cycle has been emotionally exhausting for many: disqualified candidates, complainants, and even the general candidates. Experiencing this firsthand, I feel morally obligated to prevent future candidates from going through the same, because what happened this year should NEVER happen again.

If given the opportunity to serve as Elections Commissioner, my goal is to reform the process to make it fair, clear, stress-free, and supportive for all involved. I believe DASG has a huge potential, but it can only be realized if the elections are structured to ensure that the right people are given the chance to serve.

In critically analyzing what went wrong during this year's election cycle, I identified several issues, both within the elections code and in the overall process, that need to be addressed. I have a lot of ideas that, if elected, I would like to bring to discussion to possibly implement in the code.

One key concept would be to limit campaigning to one week, during which voting would not be permitted. This would give students the chance to hear from all candidates, and ensure students cannot be pressured into voting. Voting would begin only after the campaign period ends, encouraging more informed and intentional decision-making. Additionally, I propose banning official coalitions to reduce confusion, but groups of candidates would still be allowed to informally campaign together.

To maintain fairness, I believe campaigns should be conducted solely by the candidates themselves, without direct assistance from friends or family to ensure a fair campaigning process. I also support having disqualification decisions reviewed and voted on by the full senate, rather than by only the admin committee, to preserve objectivity.

Lastly, I believe the elections code must undergo a comprehensive revision to eliminate loopholes and ensure it reflects the evolving needs of our student body. These are just a few of the many ideas I hope to contribute to strengthening the integrity and transparency of our elections.

2. What are some of the skills and experiences that you will bring to the DASG Senate?

I have served as student body president in both my Italian high school and American high school, and I bring with me extensive leadership experience. These roles have equipped me with strong organizational, communication, and problem-solving skills that I believe will benefit both the Elections Committee and the Senate as a whole.

I believe DASG should reach a broader portion of our student population, and I plan to use my background in technology and marketing to develop digital tools that encourage greater participation in the voting process. This will help ensure that our elected representatives truly reflect the diverse voices on campus. People often refer to me as a very rational individual, and this would be an important skill if the code needs to be clear and logical.

In addition, I am a very diplomatic person, committed to be as unbiased as humanly possible. Having closely followed and experienced the entire election process this year, I bring not only knowledge but also a deep understanding of the improvements that need to be made.

To the whole Senate, I aim to bring innovation, inclusivity, and renewed energy, along with a sense of collaboration and positivity.



1. Why do you want to become the DASG Budget Analyst or DASG Elections Commissioner and what do you hope to achieve?

2. What are some of the skills and experiences that you will bring to the DASG Senate?

I have a diverse range of team development, financial management, and leadership skills, and I look forward to being an Internal Officer in the DASG and for the Senate overall. In high school, I initiated formation of an economics-based finance club, Fin Teens, that provided fellow students with knowledge about money's central role in one's daily life. 1. Why do you want to become the DASG Budget Analyst or DASG Elections Commissioner and what do you hope to achieve?

I want to become a DASG Budget Analyst because I'm passionate about finance. I love doing business and I understand finance is the backbone of all successful organizations. I like analyzing numbers and finding out the back stories behind all the numbers. That's why I major in Data Science. On the other hand, I really loved the Budget Deliberation experience. I attended both weekends in January and I learned so much from the experience. I got more familiar with the financial aspect of the school system, as well as the deliberation process. I wish to continue participating in the next year's Budget Deliberation.

If I become a Budget Analyst, I would improve intern preparation by asking them to review this year's budget presentations ahead of deliberations. It will give them a better understanding of Fund 41 and Fund 46.

We were assigned to do a case study for one program as interns before the deliberation this year. However, since there were not many interns who attended the meeting, we couldn't contribute too much in the sense of providing more information to the senators. Therefore, I would assign the future interns to work closely under each assigned officer as a small budget analysis team and have the interns provide a more comprehensive report to the Budget Analysts.

As the information included in these two funds is massive, it would be more efficient to break into small groups and work on each part of the project collectively. I noticed that the senators are currently taking a lot of the workload. If we can let the interns be more involved in this process, the senators can develop their leadership and management skills.

2. What are some of the skills and experiences that you will bring to the DASG Senate?

I think that the position of Budget Analyst comes with challenges and responsibilities. We will be involved in making significant decisions that will impact the entire student body. As I have 5 years of work experience prior to coming to De Anza, my experience will allow me to provide a more sophisticated perspective to the Senate.

As to my work experience, I was a sailor for 3 years, more than half of the period, I was the operations manager of a private yacht. I was handling all the budgeting for the yacht, including making a budget plan, spending reports, and presentations to the boss. From there, I learned how to handle money for other people and that the key is to focus on the details.

My family has an event holding company. I grew up working for countless events for big companies and organizations. Hence, I have ample experience in making promotional videos. Even though Finance is not an outreach committee like Events or Marketing, our job includes making videos promoting the Finance Committee and introducing Fund 41 and Fund 46 to the interns or students. In the future, we might make more videos to educate programs on how to fill out the budget application. My experience in video making can contribute to creating a more professional outcome.

Lastly, I have experience in making a podcast. I used to have a podcast show when I was in Taiwan. My skills in setting up audio recording equipment, interviewing, and audio editing can contribute to the DASG Senate as a whole if there is any work related to audiovisual content.

3. What other commitments do you have and how will you manage your time?

I work at the Police station on campus as a PSA, which would take about 10 -15 hrs per week. However, I have already managed my shift to avoid Mondays and Wednesdays. Therefore, it won't conflict with the Senate meetings. Besides that, I am currently taking four classes — two in-person and two online. My time is full but well-managed, and I'm confident that I can fully commit to the tasks that come with this position.

1. Why do you want to become the DASG Budget Analyst or DASG Elections Commissioner and what do you hope to achieve?

I am running for DASG Budget Analyst because I believe I possess the skills, commitment, and enthusiasm to improve De Anza's financial operations. I want to ensure that every program on campus is properly evaluated and reviewed, so it receives proper funding. Finance has been a long-standing passion of mine, from investing in stocks at a young age to managing the finances for my own business. In addition, I was actively involved with student government in high school, where I had the opportunity to create memorable experiences for students. As a member of my high school's community commission, I helped engage students with the local community, such as leading the creation of a webpage to connect students with local volunteer organizations, which in turn helped both students looking for volunteer work and organizations looking for help.

As a current Budget Analyst, I have had the opportunity to implement meaningful changes and create a significant impact on the De Anza community. One of the main initiatives I am currently leading is improving the intern program within the finance committee. Having served as both an intern and a Senator this year, I have noticed a significant disconnect between the two groups. Finance is a unique committee, as our proceedings are mostly formal, with little room for team bonding during meetings. As a result, many interns do not get the opportunity to connect with each other and with senators. In response, I am currently working on implementing a new format. Each month, interns will be placed into randomized groups of four and assigned to analyze a specific program together. In turn, both senators and interns benefit. The interns have the ability to bond and build relationships with each other, while also providing in depth information about specific programs to senators. This will allow DASG to make more informed financial

recommendations during budget deliberations. I believe that making these changes will have a long term, positive effect on the finance committee and the intern process.

2. What are some of the skills and experiences that you will bring to the DASG Senate?

As described above, I have been passionate about both finance and business throughout my life, and I have spent years developing these skills. To this end, one of my most relevant experiences has been creating and managing a business, which I grew from an initial \$100 investment to over \$40,000 in revenues within nine months. Today, this venture is generating around \$10,000 in monthly revenue which continues to grow. While the financial success of starting a business is rewarding, more importantly, this venture has taught me many invaluable lessons about business, finance, and entrepreneurship. In addition to learning the basics of buying and selling products, I have also gained an understanding of how to manage the business's finances, including managing inventory, tracking the constant flow of thousands of dollars in purchases and sales, and managing income and cash flow balances. Running this business has also taught me accounting skills, as I have learned about the many complications of filing taxes, tracking deductions, and balancing the costs of an employee and overhead. This adventure has taught me an enormous amount about the many complications an entrepreneur faces.
