International students who's first language isn't English may not know who to vote for, what classes to take, or how to participate in important clubs or workshops and events like Club Day. In regards to this, I also feel that the level of bureaucracy is extremely hard for anyone who speaks any less than intermediate fluent English to understand. There are thousands of ways to transfer and figure out your college plan, but the pathways and websites are simply not easy to understand or accessible for international students. De Anza gives students accommodations and help through the International Student Programs, but because of low funding and high demand, their efforts can fall short. This, combined with the general campus community appealing primarily to domestic students puts international students at a disadvantage.

1. Why do you want to become the DASG Internal Officer position you applied for and what do you hope to achieve?

Growing up, I always felt like the odd one out. As a Hispanic kid in an 85% Asian school, it was difficult to fit in, and for many years I felt like my voice wasn't heard and it was very isolating. Eventually, I was able to break free from this through the activities that I got involved in. I joined sports teams, math competitions, and student associations at my high school. It was the communities that I fostered there that began to help me open up and feel supported and heard. Community college can be pretty isolating, and I want to help as many people as possible find community and resources as soon as they step on campus. This applies especially to underrepresented groups, whether it be by ethnicity, disabilities, mental health struggles, or any other cause. In short, I want to make De Anza a more equitable environment. I specifically want to bring more minority groups into student organizations like clubs, ICC, and DASG. Later, I will address specific actions that I believe we could take in order to achieve the goals outlined above.

2. What are some of the skills and experiences that you will bring to the DASG Senate?

I have a lot of experience specifically with equity and providing support to groups in need. As an intern and then treasurer for Active Minds, I helped make posts and come up with event ideas like therapy dogs, yoga, and llamas. (yes, we will be having llamas on campus, and you should totally come if you have time:) I focused on making all our posts and flyers inclusive, and helped our team organize workshops and guest speaker events. We brought in mental health speakers to speak about mental health in underrepresented groups, neurodiversity, and other very relevant topics for community college students.

As a member of the Santa Clara County Office of Education, I helped Lead team of 12 to create

integrated stigma reducing mental wellness centers at middle schools in my county, and develop a zoom "hotline" to assist youth in need or distress. We helped increase student engagement with school psychologists by 26% in just a few months.

Additionally, I have experience with dedication and perseverance, which I think are very useful for an important role such as senator. Since I couldn't find a job in 2023, I started an e-commerce business and worked tirelessly to secure funding, develop a product, advertise it, and bring it to market. My business started off unsuccessfully, and it was very discouraging for me to see that cash I had worked so hard to obtain being spent. But I didn't give up, and constantly found new ways to contribute to the business - it eventually paid off. I ended up becoming profitable, and it was a great experience for me to learn to be committed and stick to what I'm doing when I truly believe in it.

I have great communication skills. As a multicultural student, I have interacted with people of very diverse backgrounds from an early age, and I understand the nuances of communication in different cultures (more than just language).

Lastly, I have a lot of marketing experience, having helped with posts and reels for Active Minds. If needed, I can help with any marketing tasks! I will attach an example of something that I did below.

3. What other commitments do you have and how will you manage your time?

I don't have many commitments, since I've completed all of my required coursework and will only be taking part-time classes. I am committed to dedicating over 20 hours a week just for DASG.

I am currently the Active Minds treasurer, and will continue to be a part of the organization. We currently have meetings once a week on Sundays evenings, but each quarter we fill out a when2meet to make sure to pick a time that fits everyone's schedules.

I will make sure to pick a time that doesn't conflict with my DASG responsibilites, and will prioritize DASG events and meetings.

4. Additional Comments (maximum 200 words)

I understand I'm new to DASG unlike many of the current interns that will be applying. I originally planned to transfer this year, however due to financial reasons I will be staying until next summer.

I have been interested in joining DASG since last year, but I didn't think it would be possible as I was planning on transferring. I'm thrilled for the opportunity to be a part of such a meaningful organization, and I am excited to apply all of the experience I have gained through Active minds and through my off-campus involvements in order to help the Student Rights & Equity committee, and DASG as a whole

5. What student concerns do you feel the DASG should address?

As a whole, I think there is a lack of involvement in college activities outside of a smaller subset of students. From the personal experiences that I have had speaking with students in classes, I have noticed that many either don't know much about DASG or clubs, or feel that it isn't for them. I believe this is due to a lack of information, and a lack of representation. I also think that

it's important for us to understand the thoughts of everyone on campus. As an SRE officer, here are some of the following ideas that I have:

- A qr code with an anonymous form to "Campus Climate surveys" at events like club day, where people can complete a survey to get a simple prize like a sticker or goodie bag
- Add questions like "Have you experienced or witnessed discrimination at De Anza?" ,"How well do you feel represented in campus leadership?", "What changes would make you feel more inclined to get involved in school organizations?"
- Bringing in speakers from underrepresented communities. It's important to include incentives, however, as from my club experience, people are hesitant to come to these due to stigma surrounding these communities. I have researched and contacted organizations such as Triangle speakers (LGBTQ) and The Arc (Disabilities), both of which have said they would be willing to host events on campus.
- Continue Instagram posts for Pride Month, Disability Rights Month, African American Heritage Month, Indigenous Heritage month. Include events and workshops such as painting on canvas, and making a collage with everyone's paintings.
- Market scholarships better. Many DA students that I have spoken to, particularly from underrespresented groups, don't even consider UCs due to financial reasons.

I joined DASG to create a more equitable campus environment for students - I want to use my communication skills and diverse background to strengthen the bonds between students from all backgrounds. When I first came to De Anza, I felt pretty lost and isolated, so I'm going to do my best to help others find community and feel appreciated!
