FILM/TV 78x: SPECIAL TOPICS IN FILM STUDIES | FOCUS: SCREENWRITING

Description: Concentrated investigation of an influential film artist, studio, national cinema, genre, movement or historical period.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- Analyze the various creative, craft and business aspects of the current film, television and digital media industry through screenings, events, and visits from working professionals.
- Apply an analytical approach learned in class to examine a screenplay and/or the narrative, visual and aural elements of a motion picture.

Goals: By the end of the quarter, students will:

- Have gained a working knowledge of the day-to-day working life of a professional screenwriter.
- Have a clearer understanding of the industry at large, including tangible steps one should consider to launch a career.

Assignments: Students will engage with guest speakers from the entertainment industry and analyze selected media, articles and screenplays linked from Canvas.

This class will start by exploring the work of screenwriters, writer-director auteurs, and broaden to include areas of development in film and television, career paths and opportunities. Students will have the opportunity to ask guest speakers about development, filmmaking and writing, and strategies for breaking into the industry. Guests may include an Emmy-winning local filmmaker and editor, a film archivist, working screenwriters including recent Academy Nichol Fellowship Winners and writing and development assistants at major management and production companies.

Methods: Assigned readings, lectures, film and video screenings, class discussions and workshops, written work.

Note: Due to the nature of the course, adult themes and language will be used.

<u>Primary Recommended Text:</u> The Protagonist's Journey, by Scott Myers. Instructor will provide free electronic access.
