Objectives: Differentiate between major camera types (analog and digital) and demonstrate basic camera controls. Create and conceptualize images using digital techniques and practices. Organize, process, and output imagery using Adobe Lightroom Classic as the primary digital darkroom. Compare and contrast traditional photographic methods with new digital methods in a rapidly changing technological world. Analyze a variety of photographic works to develop and refine one's thoughts and understand diverse and multicultural communities. Finally, critique classmate's work to understand the visual and communicative value of the medium and articulate individual response and expression.
