Course Description and Objective:

This course delves deeply into the intricate world of ceramic hand building, catering to students with prior experience or a strong foundation in pottery. Through a fusion of theory and practice, participants will expand their repertoire of techniques, pushing the boundaries of clay manipulation and artistic expression.

Students will explore hand building methods such as pinch, coil, and slab-built ceramic work as well as complex surface decoration techniques. Emphasis will be placed on refining craftsmanship, honing attention to detail, and cultivating a distinctive artistic voice.

Drawing inspiration from historical and contemporary ceramic artists, students will engage in critical discourse to deepen their understanding of ceramic aesthetics and conceptual frameworks. Through critiques and peer feedback sessions, students will develop their ability to articulate artistic intentions and engage in constructive dialogue within the ceramic community.

By the culmination of the course, students will have produced a cohesive body of work that reflects their artistic evolution and technical proficiency in ceramic hand building. Whether aspiring towards professional practice or seeking to deepen their artistic exploration, this course equips students with the skills, knowledge, and confidence to excel in the dynamic realm of ceramic art

Student Learning Outcome Statement (SLO):

- Demonstrate competency in hand construction techniques; pinch, coil, slab.
- Demonstrate competency in glaze and slip application

Course Objectives:

- Develop skills in hand building ceramic construction.
- Evaluate the process of hand built ceramic work.
- Evaluate the nature and importance of hand built ceramic objects.
- Complete a series of hand built finished clay pieces.

Required Materials: Notebook at least 8"

Participation:

Attendance and participation are essential for students to be successful in both art and academics. Students are expected to want to be in class each day and be active in their and other's education. If you are absent, please let me know the reason for the absence as soon as possible. Each class period will have new material presented and if you miss it is your responsibility to make sure that you learn the material and make up any assignments that you missed when allowed. You are free to ask other students to take notes for you so that you understand the information presented or ask me about it during my office hour before class. There will be a brief "Class 15 Minute Sketch" at the beginning of each class you must be present and on time to receive points for this classroom assignment. These assignments cannot be made up.

If you are unable to complete the class, it is your responsibility to drop the class through the Admissions and Records office. You should not ghost the class this will result in a F.

Criteria for Evaluation:

A high degree of commitment to this class is expected. Your presence, persistence, imagination, attention to detail, and level of involvement will help to determine the quality of your work.

Projects will be graded according to the following criteria:

20% for work made in greenware (clay forms that are unfired)

20% for work made and bisqued (clay forms that have gone through the 1st firing process)

20% for work glazed fired (clay forms that have gone through both firings and are glazed)

15% for craftsmanship (attention to detail and quality of work)

15% for execution of technique (proper construction, decoration, and glazing techniques used) 10% for creativity

ARTS 18 D Assignments

1. Two Lidded Boxes: Mokoto Takahashi & Takahiro Kondo Inspired (Weeks 1-3) (50 pts.)

- One made from rigid slabs and one made from a single solid block of clay (25 points each)
- -The boxes must include a sunk in gallery and flanged lid
- Liquid latex will be used for the gallery and lid

2. Extruded and Pinch Pot Structure: An Anh Léon-Inspired Form (Weeks 4-5) (50 pts.)

- In this assignment, you will explore architectural form, repetition, and spatial tension through the use of the clay extruder and simple pinch pot method as primary handbuilding tools. Drawing inspiration from artist Anh Léon's intricate wooden structures, you will design and construct a ceramic form that captures the essence of nature.

3. Ceramic Still Life from Wet Slabs: Stephanie H. Shih & Mitchell Spain (Weeks 6-8) (50 pts.)

- Design and construct a three-piece ceramic still life arrangement, including at least one object shaped with a conical template (e.g., a vase or funnel-like form). Using wet slabs, students will cut, assemble, and refine the forms to create a cohesive composition that emphasizes balance and contrast in shape and proportion.

4. Sculpture (Weeks 8-11, Final) (50 pts.)

- Create a sculpture incorporating multiple components and utilizing slab built construction techniques and at least 1 of the other techniques present in the prior 3 assignments or the Class 15 Minute Sketches.

There is also the potential for using studio recycled clay free of charge but this will require a little work in processing this clay. Please speak with me if you would like to use recycled clay.
